- ✓ Provides students with state ID cards, birth certificates, food, clothing, and rental assistance for families.
- ✓ Services provided free of charge to families
- ✓ Reduced recidivism

## **Statistics**

- √ 700 youth served between 2018-2022
- √ 78% graduated successfully
- √ 96% of graduates had no new charges post 1 year

This funding was made possible through the passage of Senate Bill 367 which reallocated funds originally used to maintain children's correctional facilities and now is used to keep kids in their communities and offer support.
