
**GOVERNOR PARKINSON AND SECRETARY WERHOLTZ HONOR
KANSAS DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS
EMPLOYEE AND VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR AWARD RECIPIENTS**

Governor Mark Parkinson and Kansas Secretary of Corrections Roger Werholtz honored Department of Corrections employees and volunteers Wednesday for their service to the State of Kansas during an awards ceremony held at the State Capitol.

In announcing the four recipients of the Department's 2009 Employee and Volunteer of the Year awards, Governor Parkinson thanked all Department employees for their commitment to ensuring public safety.

Governor Parkinson signed a proclamation earlier this month that designated the week of May 3-9, 2009 as Kansas Correctional Employees Week. The ceremony and proclamation honored correctional employees who work mostly outside the public's view yet who help every day to make Kansas safer. A copy of the proclamation follows.

Those receiving special recognition were:

- The 2009 Uniformed Employee of the Year - Lt. Maria Bos, a Corrections Specialist II from El Dorado Correctional Facility;
- The 2009 Non-Uniformed Employee of the Year - Harold Sass, an Information Consultant III from Lansing Correctional Facility;
- The 2009 Contract Employee of the Year - Officer Doug Mitchell, Wichita Police Department, who serves the Southern Parole Region; and,
- The 2009 Volunteer of the Year - Sharon Leiker who is a volunteer for Norton Correctional Facility.

Following the ceremony, Topeka State Senator Laura Kelly spoke at a luncheon hosted by Topeka Correctional Facility to recognize the 42 Employee and Volunteer of the Year Award nominees. Kelly, who worked in a minimum-security prison for boys in Illinois following her graduation from college, noted that correctional employees provide a service that is crucial to the state's well being.

"Kansas is a better place to live because of you," she said.

In his remarks, Secretary Werholtz acknowledged staff for their dedication to the Department's mission despite recent budget cuts and working with an inmate population that has more severe mental health needs and been sentenced for increasingly more violent crimes.

"You're the best at what you do," he said. "In the coming years, we're going to need that from you and more. We need you to expect more from your co-workers and show them how to deliver on that expectation. Anything less puts your co-workers and the public at greater risk."

Nominees honored during the luncheon were:

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UNIFORMED

El Dorado Correctional Facility (EDCF)

Maria Bos, Corrections Specialist II

Maria has taken a lead role in improving the efficiency of the disciplinary division at EDCF. As a Corrections Specialist II, Maria implemented a process by which inmate disciplinary hearings can be conducted by telephone. Her suggestion to move to double-sided printing reduced the amount of paper used for the division's records by 40 percent.

Known as someone who volunteers to fill any area of need, Maria has steadily been promoted since becoming a Corrections Officer in 2000. She also served as a Corrections Counselor II for the North Unit until she was promoted to her current position in 2007. Maria is the 2009 Kansas Department of Corrections Uniformed Employee of the Year.

Ellsworth Correctional Facility (ECF)

Troy M. Frimmel, Corrections Officer II

Troy is admired for his calm demeanor and his fairness in his interactions with ECF staff and inmates. Since 1989, Troy has served in several capacities including as Tool Control Officer, a General Utility Detail Supervisor, a backup Key Control Officer and Relief Armorer. Currently, he also serves as a Staff Development Faculty Member and is the Special Operations and Response Team Commander. With an ability to remain composed in all situations, Troy has never wavered in his commitment to ensuring the safety of staff, inmates and the general public.

Hutchinson Correctional Facility (HCF)

Gary Hook, Corrections Officer II

Gary began as a Corrections Officer with HCF in 1987. He transferred to the position of Inside General Utilities Supervisor in 2001 when he also assumed the duties of horticulturalist for the Central Unit. Gary's dedication encourages his crew to tackle tasks beyond their assigned duties. Gary is known for completing 12 hours of work in an eight-hour day.
