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Preface

This report provides a detailed statistical profile of adult offenders in the Kansas correctional system and describes the State's offender commitment and release trends. As in previous years, the report is based on data obtained through an on-line computerized offender information system. Information is collected systematically during the entire period offenders are in the custody or control of the Secretary of Corrections. The number of offenders for whom information is available varies across data items reported. Percentages reported are based upon the number of individuals for whom data are available, and not necessarily upon the total population.

In accordance with Kansas Senate Bill 748, effective May 24, 1990, several correctional facilities were consolidated and/or renamed. Subsequent administrative actions taken by the Department of Corrections in August 1990 and in June 1991 resulted in further facility

consolidation. The newer facilities, El Dorado Correctional Facility (Central Unit) and Larned Correctional Mental Health Facility, opened in June 1991 and January 1992, respectively. On September 1, 1996, Wichita Work Release Facility became a unit of Winfield Correctional A number of housing units and Facility. placement options were closed during FY 2009 because of budget constrictions: At Lansing Correctional Facility (South Unit at Osawatomie); at El Dorado Correctional Facility (East Unit at Toronto and North Unit at El Dorado); at Norton Correctional Facility (East Unit at Stockton); and Labette CCC).

Table A lists current facilities and unit designations along with prior names and designations. In addition to the facilities listed, inmates were also housed at Larned State Hospital (LSH) during FY 2010. Figure A is a Kansas map showing locations of the correctional facilities.



Introduction

The Statistical Profile Report provides information about offenders within the Kansas Correctional System. The report begins with Section 1 by graphically summarizing recent trends and focuses on population levels, offender commitment trends. and characteristics. Subsequent sections present more specific topics in greater detail. Section II compares inmate population and housing capacity levels and Section III describes admissions to and releases from KDOC custody. Section IV provides a description of offenders in prison on June 30, 2010, while Section V contains a summary of information on the post-incarceration supervision population. Each section begins with summary presentation and is followed by statistical tables and graphs.

The report focuses on comparing current information with prior years wherever possible. Nonetheless, much of the offenserelated information is restricted to recent years because terms used for many years-for example, "felony class of offense" "controlling minimum offense"—no longer apply to all offenders. Applicable to all offenders, including those sentenced under the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act of 1993, is the "most serious offense for the current incarceration." This replaces "controlling minimum offense." Also still applicable to all offenders is the "overall most serious offense."






Inmate Population and Post-incarceration Population Under In-state Supervision: Fiscal Years 2000-2010*

Inmate Population and Post-incarceration Population Under In-state Supervision: Fiscal Year 2010 By Month*





Yearly Admissions and Releases: Fiscal Years 2000 - 2010





Average Number of Admissions and Releases Per Month by Major Category: Comparison of FY 2006 Through FY 2010





While on Post-incarceration Status: FY 2000 - 2010



Capacity vs. Inmate Population as of June 30, 2010: by Gender and Security/Custody Designation




Total Inmate Population: FY 2000 - 2010*



Demographics: June 30, 2010 Inmate Population*









<u>Fiscal Year 2010:</u> Offender Population Levels and Institutional Capacity

Components of the System-wide Offender Population

- Total number of offenders under management is 16,171, an increase of 2.1% from 15,832 the previous year.
- Primary components of June 30, 2010 system population are as follows:
 - Offenders Confined. Inmates confined in Kansas correctional facilities numbered 8,871 or 55% of the system population. Additional offenders under management are 133 inmates serving in absentia or on compact status out-of-state.
 - Offenders Not Confined. In-state parole caseload-Kansas offenders on parole/conditional release or post-release supervision in Kansas and compact parole/probation cases supervised in Kansas numbered 6,066 or 38% of the system population. Additional offenders under management include 917 under out-of-state supervision and 184 on abscond status.

Current Inmate Population

- On June 30, 2010 the total inmate population was 8,871, an increase of 261 (3.0%) from June 30, 2009.
 - The number of inmates in facilities operated by the Department of Corrections was 8,756 and the population in contract placement was 115.
- The FY 2010 average daily population was 8,689, an increase of 99 (1.2%) from 8,590 in FY 2009.

- Total inmate population on September 30, 2010 was 9,014 up 143 (1.6%) from 8,871 on June 2010.
- In-state post-incarceration caseload on September 30, 2010 was 5,914 down 152 (2.5%) from 6,066 on June 30, 2010.

Capacity of Correctional Facilities

- The total capacity, including placements in non-KDOC facilities, was 8,880 as of June 30, 2010.
 - Of the total capacity, 749 beds were designated for female occupancy.
- The capacity for placement of inmates at non-DOC facilities was 131. This total includes beds at Larned State Hospital and at contract jail facilities. The beds at Labette Correctional Conservation Camp closed in FY 2009.



Fiscal Years 2000 - 2010*



SECTION III

Fiscal Year 2010 Admissions and Releases

Information pertaining to admissions and releases of offenders during FY 2010 is summarized in this section. The basic data is presented in Tables 4 and 5. Detailed information on court-related admissions to the system is presented by type of offense and county of commitment. Also included as part of this section is information on two topics that are

central to the discussion of admissions and releases—rate of parole and offender recidivism. Unless otherwise noted, all admission and release information pertains to admission "events" and release "events" (figures include any multiple admissions and/or multiple releases of an offender).

Summary of Admission and Release Activities

- The number of admissions and releases for the past 10 years is presented graphically in Figures 15 and 16.
- FY 2010 admissions and releases:
 - Total number of admissions was 5,059 up 408 (8.8%) from 4,651 in FY 2009.
 - Total number of releases was 4,801 –up 110 (2.3%) from 4,691 in FY 2009.
 - <u>Probation Violator Admissions</u>: Information on yearly admissions for probation violation is presented below by category. The number of probation violators (no new sentence) continues to account for about +one-third of total admissions.

- <u>Return Admissions</u>: As shown in the table below, the two types of admission for violations while on post-incarceration supervision, new sentence and condition violation (no new sentence), together comprised 24.6% of total admissions in FY 2010 – down from 27.4% in FY 2009.
 - New sentence returns: For FY 2000 this type of return admission was 5% of total admissions. Since then it has been 3%-4%.
 - Condition violator returns: In FY 2010 condition violation admissions accounted for 21% of the total admissions, the lowest figure for the 10-year period. It should be noted that in the inmate population on hand at any given time, the proportion most recently admitted as condition violators is much smaller (7.2% on June 30, 2010).
 - Also note that a significant number of those officially admitted as condition violators (no new sentence) actually had new felony convictions, the court documentation for which was not received until after admission.

As shown below, the ratio of condition violation returns to the average daily population (ADP) of all Kansas offenders on supervised release indicates that the proportion of offenders that are returned has decreased in the past several years, especially FY 2009 [Higher Number = Lower Rate of Return]:

Admissions by Court Actions

• The distribution of the FY 2010 court commitments by type of crime indicates that the most serious active offense for the current incarceration was a "person" offense in 47% of the cases and was a "non-person" offense in 53% of the cases. Drug offenses and property offenses comprised the bulk of the non-person offenses.

 The distribution of the FY 2010 court commitments by county indicates that four counties (Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte) collectively account for over half (56%) of the total.

 In FY 2010 there were 67 admissions of offenders under age eighteen at the time of offense, up somewhat from FY 2009 but down markedly from a decade ago.

Rate of Parole

The information presented on rate of parole pertain to the relatively few offenders who are still subject to release via the Kansas Parole Board. The information presented here reflects Kansas Parole Board decisions only and not actual parole exits from correctional facilities. The length of the period of time between the decision to parole and the actual release varies among cases.

• The rate of parole for FY 2010 was 32.2% - down from 36.7% in FY 2009. It should be noted that with the application of the provisions of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act, which began in FY 1994, most offenders are released to post-incarceration supervision rather than being considered for parole through the parole hearing process. Also, the data on parole decisions, as in past years, is limited to regular parole hearing decisions (whether by regular hearing, special minute, etc.) that were recorded by KPB staff. Excluded are decisions from parole violation hearings (outcomes of which include a new regular hearing date being set, a future release date being set, or the offender being "re-paroled").

Releases to Post-incarceration Supervision

- As in previous years, the releases to post-incarceration supervision occurring in FY 2010 were concentrated in a few counties/states:
 - Four counties (Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte) collectively account for 60.3% of the total number of in-state releases. Sedgwick County alone received 1,132 (30.3%) of the statewide total.
 - Three states (Missouri, Oklahoma, and Texas) collectively account for nearly half (47.5%) of the total number of out-of-state releases. Missouri alone received 125 (32%).

Offender Recidivism

The rate of offender recidivism has been operationally defined by the Department as the rate of return to Kansas prisons by offenders released to post-incarceration supervision. In deriving the data on this measure each offender is tracked individually for the specified length of the follow-up period. Separate rates are calculated for those returning with new


sentences and those returning with no new sentences. A graphic summary of the return rates for three yearly cohorts of releasees (FY 2005 FY 2006, and FY 2007) is presented in Figure 19. Table 9 contains more detailed information regarding the return rates for the release cohorts for these years and other years (Fiscal Years 2002 – 2009).

 "Overall return rate" (combined returns via new sentence, no new sentence, new commitment after discharge, plus those for whom parole warrants were in effect as of the end of the follow-up period) for the release cohorts was as follows:







In some instances it is possible for the number of "No Returns" during the year to be greater than that of a preceding year. When such reinstatements occur, the affected offenders move from the absconder group to the "No Return" group for the latest year.

SECTION IV

June 30, 2010: Profile of the Inmate Population

This section provides a description of selected characteristics of the inmate population confined within Kansas correctional facilities on June 30, 2010, the last day of FY 2010. The focus of this profile information is on the demographic attributes and social backgrounds of the

offenders, the nature of the offenses for which incarcerated, the sentences imposed, and the criminal histories of the offenders. The inmate population was composed of 8,269 males and 602 females, for a total of 8,871.

Characteristics of the Inmate Population

- The list below summarizes some of the basic characteristics of the inmate population on June 30, 2010. Each of the following characteristics was observed in at least half the inmates upon admission to the correctional system (or, as in the case of "age" and "length of current confinement," the status as of June 30, 2010):
 - Sex Male (93.2%)
 - Racial/ethnic Group White (with large non-white minority)
 - Age Average age 36.5 years.
 - Formal Education (at admission) High school graduate, G.E.D., or more (56%) (In the years 1992 and before the majority had less than high school or G.E.D.)
 - Formal Vocational Training None (72%)
 - Type of Admission New court commitment, including probation violators (83%)
 - Type of Offense (overall most serious offense) Person crime (73%)
 - Duration of Confinement To-date (through 6-30-2010) 24 months or less (52%)

- There is considerable difference among the correctional facilities with regard to the demographic and criminal history characteristics of the inmate population housed. To a great extent this reflects the assignment of housing according to the security needs of the inmates, as well as their needs for particular correctional programs and services.
- The distribution of the inmate population by custody classification was as follows on June 30, 2010:

Inmate Employment Status and Program Assignments

• On June 30, 2010, 6,215 (70.1%) of the total inmate population of 8,871 had primary work, program (including treatment programs), academic, or vocational assignments (Table 13, Part 2). For most inmates, the primary assignment was full-time, meaning that a single work or program assignment occupies the inmate for more than half the workday, usually for 6.5 hours or more. The 178 inmates counted in the "Treatment Program" column are those whose primary assignment (payroll category) is "treatment." Many in this group are in treatment half-time and also work at a job. Thus, the total in this category is not meant to be construed as the total involved in treatment, since many additional inmates participate in these and other programs on a part-time basis.

Note that the 115 inmates in contract placement (Larned State Hospital) are counted and considered to have primary work/program assignments.

- The proportion with primary work/program assignments (70.1%) was about the same as in FY 2009.
- Of the 2,656 inmates without primary assignments (Table 13, Part 2, the three columns under "No Primary Assign" (except for the 115 offenders assigned to non-KDOC facilities):
 - 1,320 had no assignment because they were in some type of segregation, orientation, evaluation, medical "lay-in", or did not yet have a payroll record.
 - 1,336 were not assigned because they were in transition between assignments, or because an assignment was not available on the specified date ("No Work Available" category), or because they were unwilling or temporarily unable to be assigned ("Cause" category).
- The most common institutional assignments were of the following types: institutional support, maintenance, utility work detail, Kansas Correctional Industries, vocational or academic education, and evaluation status. Additionally, a large number of inmates housed at the smaller facilities were assigned to non-institutional work programs.

Comparison of Inmate Population by Gender

- As of June 30, 2010, the inmate population was 93.2% male and 6.8% female.
 - The women in the inmate population numbered 602, up from 589 on June 30, 2009. During FY 2010, the male inmate population increased to 8,269 from 8,021.
- Both the male ADP and the female ADP are about the same as 10 years ago (FY 2000).
- As in past years, differences have been noted between the female and male inmates on almost all the characteristics compared. Proportionately speaking, in comparison to the male population the female population:
 - contained fewer inmates in the "very young" and in the "very old" age groups
 - had been committed for less severe offenses
 - had shorter average duration of current confinement
 - had less extensive criminal histories

Characteristics of the New Admissions Population

Although the yearly turnover rate is relatively high among the offenders in the inmate population, at any point in time there is a large proportion of the group that has been counted in the yearly population for a number of years. The characteristics of newly admitted offenders have been examined in order to better assess any trends toward change in the composition of the inmate population. Included as new

admissions are new court commitments and probation violators. Many offenders in this group are also members of the end-of-year inmate population since they were still on hand as of June 30, 2010. Note that the new admissions were not necessarily first-time offenders — some had been incarcerated previously in other states or had served Kansas sentences from which they had been discharged.

- Compared to the June 30, 2009 inmate population, the FY 2010 new admissions population contained proportionately:
 - more offenders in the younger age groups
 - more women
 - · more offenders with less serious offenses

To some extent the differences noted are due to the type of offense and sentence length. The offenders with more serious offenses, extensive criminal histories, and longer sentences tend to accumulate in the inmate population. Thus, the population on hand contains proportionately more offenders with these and related characteristics than does the population of new incoming offenders.

• For purposes of describing sentence structure, the inmate population has been separated into three groups--those with only indeterminate sentencing (offenses committed prior to the effective date of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines Act of July 1, 1993), those with only determinate sentences, and those for whom both determinate and indeterminate sentences are involved. The last group includes primarily two types of offenders: Those with active sentences for crimes committed before and after July 1, 1993; and those with pre-July 1, 1993 crimes only who were eligible for sentence conversion under the Sentencing Guidelines Act.

The distribution of the three groups by sentence length is tabled below. Note that direct comparisons regarding the amount of time to serve cannot be made from this information since potential good time to be deducted from the sentence differs greatly between the two groups – a maximum of about 50% for most in the indeterminate only group versus a 15% maximum (in some cases 20%) for those with only determinate sentences.







SECTION V

June 30, 2010 Post-incarceration Offender Population

This section provides a brief description of the population of offenders in the correctional system who were on post-incarceration status as of June 30, 2010. The in-state caseload consists of Kansas offenders released to post-incarceration supervision in Kansas, as well as out-of-

state parolees and probationers received by Kansas for supervision under interstate compact. There are no Kansas probationers included in the caseload since the supervision of this group has been a function of the district courts since July 1, 1979.

Population Under Management of Parole Services

- The FY 2010 year-end in-state supervision population of 6,066 (the number of Kansas offenders supervised in Kansas and compact cases supervised in Kansas) is the highest year-end figure in the past decade.
- The out-of-state supervision population the number of Kansas offenders supervised in other states under compact, which had been on a downward trend for a number of years, increased to 973 on June 30, 2008, than decreased to 911 and 917 at year-end FY 2009 and 2010.
- The number on abscond status decreased sharply in FY 2001. This reflects the impact of Senate Bill 323, as well as the focus on locating and returning absconders. Beginning in FY 1994, the Department formed a "Special Enforcement Unit" to be responsible for locating and arresting offenders who abscond supervision or in some other fashion violate the conditions of release. It is probable that the work of this group has contributed significantly to the continuing reduction in the number of absconders.
- The distribution of the in-state supervision population by physical location (county) is presented in Figure 24.

Composition of Post-incarceration Supervision Caseload


- As of June 30, 2010 there was a total in-state caseload of 6,066 offenders under supervision of Kansas parole officers.
 - The total in-state caseload increased by 130 (2.2%) from FY 2009.
 - The year-end average caseload per officer was 55, not much different than in recent years.

Characteristics of Kansas Offenders Under Post-incarceration Supervision in Kansas

- The basic profile information on the characteristics of the population of Kansas offenders on post-incarceration supervision in Kansas suggests relatively little change in the past several years.
- As indicated in Figure 25, there are substantial differences among the offender populations with regard to type of offense (most serious offense for current incarceration):
- June 30, 2010 Inmate Population and Post-incarceration Population:
 - Of the inmates confined in prison there was 72% with person offenses and only 7% with property offenses, compared to 63% person offenses and 7% property offenses for the population of offenders under post-incarceration supervision.
- FY 2010 Admissions Population and Releases Population:
 - Of the incoming offenders 47% had person offenses and 19% property offenses compared to 54% person offenses and 13% property offenses for the population of outgoing offenders.

- Within the June 30, 2010 post-incarceration population there was a total of 1,911 out-of-state offenders being supervised in Kansas (574 parole cases and 1,337 probation cases).
- As of June 30, 2010, there was a total of 917 Kansas cases being supervised out-of-state -nearly half (48.6%) in Missouri, Oklahoma, and Texas collectively.








Comparison of Offender Populations: Distribution by Type of Crime (Most Serious Offense for Current Incarceration)*







June 30, 2010 Inmate Population (N=8,871)




Compact Felony Cases Serving Parole or Probation in Kansas by Sending State: June 30, 2010*
